MONDAY, OCTOBER 11, 1880. THE plot thickens. The European news contained in our issue of Saturday last, show that the tangled skein of Eastern affairs is becoming a veritable Gordian knot, and one which will not be perhaps unravelled till some modern Alexander ends the difficulty with his sword.

Another petition is being largely signed by the ratepayers of Parawai Riding, the prayer of which is that their district be merged into the Borough. This time there is every probability of Parawai becoming a portion of the municipality, the recent amendments in the Municipal Corporations Act greatly facilitating the carrying out of the wishes of the majority.

At the interview between the Hon. Mr Whitaker and Tamati Paetai on Saturday, the disputed boundary of Mr Alley's land at Hikutaia, a satisfactory arrangement was made, Tamati agreed to accept 350 acres further up the valley and leave Kakaramas in six months time.

HALCOMBE. This day. A woman named Ellen Conrad met with a serious accident while crossing the railway on Saturday night. She was caught by the cow-catcher, it breaking her right thigh besides inflicting other wounds.

NELSON. This day. Kindell's flax mill at Wakefield has been destroyed by fire, caused by friction in the scutching shed, and about two tons of flax were also destroyed.

THE New Zealand Times says that since the prorogation of Parliament the Government have been in communication with Sir Julius Vogel with respect to his dual position as Agent-General of the Colony and chairman of the New Zealand Agricultural Company, and, in conformity with the wish of Parliament, the alternative of his retaining the chairmanship, was placed before him.

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THE Royal Hotel, at Onehunga has been burnt to the ground. It cost four thousand pounds, and belonged to Mr George. There was no water available.

WELLINGTON. This day. A young man named Walter Frank Thomas, on two charges of larceny from an hotel, was sentenced to three months' hard labor.

THE Governor's Movement. The steamer Southern Cross has arrived from Leuka. The Captain reports that the prevailing opinion at Leuka is that Sir Arthur Gordon will be conveyed hither by the Emerald.

THE Outlaw Hunt. W. J. Hunt, commenced his action against Sir Arthur Gordon, claiming two thousand pounds for removing him wrongfully from Samoa.

OUR MINES. The gold from Saturday's retorting was to-day melted into an ingot weighing 285ozs. There is nothing new since last week in the Morning Star section, or Golden Age rise.

THE Cologne Cathedral. In 1248 a church erected on its site during the time of the Charlemagne was burned down, and in the following year the Archbishop of Cologne laid the foundation of the present beautiful and magnificent structure.
