PADDY'S MARKET

SUCCESSFUL TERMINATION.

Paddy's Market drew large crowds to Thames on Saturday afternoon, and a great business was done. Practically every stall was cleared of goods. Mr. Dunlop held an auction sale at the surprise pocket stall and successfully cleared every lot at good prices, also selling goods remaining at the various booths. Some amusing incidents occurred. One caused great merriment, a draper's "cheque" in an envelope running up to 25s. It proved on examination to be a piece of stuff of a check pattern. The purchaser paid up smilingly.

The proceedings finished up at about 9 p.m., after a very satisfactory day's business.

The art union drawing took place at 7.30 in the Central Hall, under the supervision of the Mayor and the sergeant of police. The various competitions held throughout the day were then decided, the results of which will be published in a day or two.

The general secretary and treasurer, Mrs. D. Mackay, informs us that the proceeds are far in excess of the original objective of the executive committee, viz., £300. Already over £500 has been paid in, and there still remain several amounts to come to hand. Detailed results are not at present available.

The Procession

This feature of Paddy's Market was a great attraction and drew thousands. The organising was in the hands of Mr. H. James, and he must have worked very hard to get so many exhibits. His efforts were crowned with success, as it was unanimously voted one of the best processions ever held in Thames. It was headed by the band of the 6th Hauraki Regiment under Lieut. Clarke, which contributed stirring music en route, and afterwards outside the pocket stall. The Boy Scouts under Commander W. H. Newton followed. Then Mr. White's charabanc, containing the following returned soldiers: Corpls. Wells and Milnes, Lance Corp. Gibson, Trooper Hindman, Privates Clune, Sherlock, Edwards, T. B. Penno, Hinnan, Gregory, A. Shand, Mudgey, McClair, Royal, Rifleman Bradley, also two Red Cross nurses, Misses Dorell. Following these were two motor cars containing Veterans W. H. Potts, T. Jackson, J. McEnteer, A. Hanlon, R. Ross, W. D. Reid. The Thames Fire Brigade's motor reel, under Supt. H. Stone, was followed by a splendid exhibit occupying two large lorries, from the Thames Old Boys' Association. First came J. Boyle, the stalwart miner of '67, carrying a large Union Jack. On the first lorry was huge blocks representing the £7,000,000 won from 1867 to 1917, being 61 tons in weight. The second lorry carried the old time miners working at shaft and mortar. The characters were well represented by R. Preece, J. Adcock, J. Boyle, J. Lyes, J. Crossie, A. McDuff, and R. McGregor. About 100 Thames old boys followed the exhibit. Messrs Phillips and Molloy's exhibit was a very pretty one, being a decorated cab conveying a bridal party. The bride was Miss M. Guy, the bridegroom Master A. Potter, the best man Mas. C. Webb, bridesmaids Misses K. Phillips and C. Clark. They were driven by the popular Chris. Molloy. The industrial section was a representation by the Amalgamated Society of Engineers (S. Willetts president) displaying their work. The Co-operative Fishermen's Society, in charge of A. Howe, showed blocks of coloured ice containing fish, flowers, etc. This exhibit excited much favourable comment. The boiler-makers' exhibit was in charge of J. Armstrong, showing men making one of A. and G. Prieo's cars for their engines. H. Peters' printing press was manned by some artistically "got up" printer's devils, printing dogers. The Trumpet Band, under A. Mollivado, also marched and played during the route. Messrs Kenny Bros' exhibit was a very attractive one, and received much praise, being a lorry drawn by four fine horses with a large swing erected on the lorry, and four little girls, Misses C. Kenny, M. Whelan, A. Dobson, and L. McGlinn on the swing, the whole being entitled "Young New Zealanders Swinging to Victory."

They followed a large number of decorated cars, including employees of Messrs R. P. Gibbons, Ltd., Mr. Dodd at the wheel, which car was awarded first prize. Messrs Miller, Hall, Phillips, Elliot, and others and a number of decorated carts, comic turnouts, and originals, the best being Mr. C. Hawkes, the swagsman, and a broken down motor drawn by a horse. Then mounteds, representing North American Indian, jockeys, etc., the whole making a lengthy and picturesque procession.

Championship: Boiler Makers. Engineers and Old Boys tied for Industrial, and the Bridal Party was highly commended. Best Decorated Vehicle: Kenny's Young New Zealand. Originals (senior): C. Hawkes, and junior Stevenson as a Red Indian. Comics (senior): Hoyle and Middleton (Keystone), and junior C. Homan as a clown. Best Decorated Car: Dodd. Mounteds: Willetts as Red Indian. Boy's Decorated Bicycle: Grubb. Dr. Lapraik and Mr Chapman were judges.

THE CHURCHES

(Under this head we publish brief communicated reports of advertised services.)

BAPTIST AND CONGREGATIONAL

The services in this church yesterday were conducted by the Rev. J. Farquharson Jones, B.D. In the morning he preached his sermon by a brief address to the boys and girls on the need for a reverent attitude during the time for prayer. The subject of his discourse was "True array of the worshipper," and his text "O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness," revealed not only the object of worship but also the dress without which no man could see the Lord—the holiness or separateness which was the beauty in which God delighted. In the course of his remarks the rev. gentleman declared that worship was not only the necessity of the individual, but was an absolute duty to God as the giver of all good, to himself and to his children. The service concluded with the usual monthly communion which was well attended. At night, the address was of an evangelical character, the preacher seeking to drive home the great truth that the only limit to the power of Jesus Christ among men was man's want of faith. Now as in the days of His flesh He could do no mighty works where men refused to meet His willingness to save by a faith in His power to do so.

METHODIST CHURCH.

The jubilee celebration of the Methodist Church was brought to a close yesterday, the Rev. J. Dawson, formerly a Primitive Methodist minister in Thames, preaching to large congregations. There was a church parade at the morning service, attended by the Regimental Band and the five brigades. The band played "The Lost Chord" as an offertory at the morning service. Lieut. Clarke was conducting. The choir sang the anthems "O Give Thanks," and "God so Love the World," and Miss Laybourn sang in the morning "Bearing His Cross," and in the evening "The Perfect Life." The whole proceedings were of a most hearty character.
