ANCIENT HISTORY

(From Thames Star, June 30, 1874)

A church parade of the Naval Brigade took place yesterday morning at St. George's, when the blue-jackets were accompanied by their close friends and comrades, the Thames Scottish and Cadets. Both bands were present, and played the usual stirring airs. The parade was a large one, and showed how these companies maintain their strength while others show a visible decline. The Thames-built steamer *Emu* has received her missing boiler in Auckland, the engines having been fitted there. Her steam trials proved very satisfactory, but she cannot proceed until passed by the Government engineer, who is absent from Auckland.

A CHEAP HOUSE PAINT

If you desire to take a splendid, yet cheap white house paint for all your poultry house, etc., the following is an excellent recipe, for you can make sufficient to give thirty square yards, two coats, this costing only a few pence to make. You can make the paint any other colour by adding colouring matter. Two quarts skim milk; eight ounces fresh elated lime; six ounces linseed oil; two ounces white Burgundy pitch; 3lb Spanish white. Slake the lime in water, expose it to the air, and mix in about one quart of the milk; the oil in which the pitch is previously dissolved to be added a little at a time; then the rest of the milk, and afterwards the Spanish white. All poultry fanciers should try this new spring.

RUGBY FOOTBALL

REPRESENTATIVE MATCH.

On Saturday afternoon at Parawai the representative fifteens of the Thames and Waikoi sub-unions were matched against each other. There was a large gathering of spectators, and these were treated to a fast, clean exhibition of Rugby football, interest being well maintained to the end of the game. The game, which was timed to commence at 3 p.m., was delayed by the failure of the Waikoi men to arrive to time, the result being that the concluding quarter was played in semi-darkness. Another cause for complaint was the absence of numerals on the Waikoi guernseys, this making it difficult to individualise Waikoi players. The order in which the men took the field was as follows:—
Thames (blue and black): J. Dufty, McLean, Winder, Poland, H. Smith, Royal, Dovell, Smith, D. Smith, Hayward, Johnson, Johnston, Wilton, Brownlee, Alexander. Waikoi (black and white): Heath, Hales, Dilamore, Saunders, Benny, O'Donnell, Mooney, Heath, Osborne, Morgan, Bayley, Agnew, Heath, Clarke.

FIRST QUARTER.

Blues won the toss, and Smith, returning the kick, set the Blue forwards going in a strong attacking movement, and played worked rapidly to White's 25's, where faulty handling on Blue's part lost them an opportunity to strike. They were not to be denied, however, and from a scrum on the White line the ball went out to the Blue back, and clear handling resulted in Winder scoring. Winder made no mistake in adding the goal-points.

SECOND QUARTER.

With the wind and sun in their favour, the Blues seemed to have the Whites in trouble from the start of the game, and Royal, securing, set up a strong forward passing rush, which ended in the Whites being compelled to force. On the kick-out fast following up by Winder again got the Whites in trouble, but good defensive work by Dilamore, Heath and Saunders averted trouble for a time. The Blue forwards were not to be denied, and Wilton headed them in an attack in which Tom Johnson scored a nice try. The goal-kick was a failure.

THIRD QUARTER.

On resumption of play Blues got busy and Winder marked. A high punt was smartly followed by the Blues and from the ruck the ball went to H. Smith—to Smith (8)—to Winder—to Poland, who failed to gather. Play hovered at centre as the result of interchange of kicks, when Dilamore for Whites was prominent through good play. A penalty was awarded the Blues, but Whites broke away until Dufty chipped in and sent play back to centre. Here Blues broke away and McLean on their wing had bad luck in being forced into touch. The Blue vanguard now had the Whites in trouble and from a line-out close to Waikoi goal-line Johnson (12) was nearly over. From a scrum which resulted the ball went from Dovell to Hayward, to Royal, to Winder, who crossed the White line and then converted his try.

LAST QUARTER.

In this spell the Whites fought an up-hill game in splendid spirit. Time and again the Blue pack, which was working with splendid combination, made strong attacks which were hard to combat. Hayward for Blues was very determined, but Heath was not found wanting. Finally the Whites found temporary relief by forcing Hayward set the Blue forwards going again, but a knock-out ended the movement. The Whites now rallied and Dufty saved. Still attacking the Whites brought play well down the field. The Blue forwards replied with a determined rush and the Whites were again in trouble. A penalty was awarded to the Blues and F. Smith kicked a beauty.
